2026 OKLAHOMA STATE FAIR – Competition Guidelines

ELIGIBILITY OF EXHIBITORS

- All Oklahoma FFA members attending and participating in the Fair will follow the FFA Code of Ethics and be an FFA member of an approved affiliated FFA chapter.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR ALL EXHIBITS

- FFA exhibits at the Oklahoma State Fair are entered and displayed at the risk of the exhibitor. The Oklahoma FFA Association in cooperation with the Oklahoma State Fair will accept exhibits and exercise due care to protect them. However, neither the Oklahoma FFA Association nor the Oklahoma State Fair can accept responsibility for loss or damage to any exhibit due to the conditions imposed by large crowds, the arrangement of buildings in which exhibits are housed or the large number of exhibits. Members who have exhibits of great sentimental and/or monetary value should carefully consider whether such exhibits should be exposed to the hazards of the fair.
- The Oklahoma State Fair and the Oklahoma FFA Association are not responsible for any lost, stolen, or damaged entries. FFA Chapters assume all risk for their entries.

SPECIAL NOTES

- FFA exhibits must be in place by Wednesday, September 16 at 7 p.m. – they **MUST** remain in place until Sunday, September 27 at 6 p.m. If exhibits are removed after 6 p.m. on Sunday, September 27, they can **ONLY** be removed via hand carry/cart. Vehicle pick-up will take place on Monday, September 28 (8:30 a.m. – 5 p.m.).
- Exhibits departing from the Oklahoma Expo Hall earlier than September 27 at 6 p.m. may lose any/all premiums.

EDUCATIONAL BOOTHS

DIVISION 5400: SUPERINTENDENT – Trevor Lucas

PURPOSE

- FFA Educational Booths are designed to showcase the benefits of Agricultural Education and FFA membership. These displays can be used in various settings, including FFA Week events, local fairs, or community gatherings. The focus is on presenting engaging, professional booths that reflect FFA's values and inspire interest in Agricultural Education and FFA.

BOOTH SPECIFICATIONS

- Size and Structure: Booths should be tabletop displays using a 6' table (provided by each chapter) that is 28" to 32" in height and width.
- Display boards should measure 4' x 8' and be constructed of ½" or 5/8" material. Boards should have two 2' wings and a 4' center back panel for easy setup.
- Back of Display Board: Painted in dark blue or black to maintain a clean, professional look.
- Table Covering: Chapters should provide their own table cover and skirting to cover the entire table down to the floor.
- Electrical Access: Outlets will be available for booths needing power.

CONTENT FOCUS

- Booths should focus on FFA's three Program of Activities (POA) divisions:
- Growing Leaders – Highlight leadership and career development activities. Include visuals or interactive elements that show how FFA builds future leaders in agriculture.
- Building Communities – Showcase community involvement and service. Examples might include chapter outreach projects, community service, or partnerships with local organizations.
- Strengthening Agriculture – Emphasize agricultural education, industry connections, and sustainability efforts. Demonstrations, visuals, or interactive elements should illustrate FFA's impact on the agriculture industry.
- Each booth should clearly display the local chapter name and highlight all three divisions.

DESIGN STANDARDS

- Brand Alignment: Follow FFA Brand Guidelines for colors, fonts, and logos to ensure consistency.
- Booths should highlight activities and impacts relevant to the three POA divisions: Growing Leaders, Building Communities, and Strengthening Agriculture.
- Booths are encouraged to include engaging features such as videos, QR codes linking to online resources, or interactive components relevant to each POA division.

BOOTH DIVISIONS

- Booths will be divided into two categories:
- Mechanical Division: Booths that incorporate powered displays, such as moving parts, fans, lights, or electronic devices.
- Non-Mechanical Division: Booths without powered elements, though static lighting is allowed. Flashing

- or rotating lights are not permitted in this category.
- Each chapter may enter in one division only.

FFA EDUCATIONAL BOOTH JUDGING RUBRIC (TOTAL: 50 POINTS)

- **Content and Alignment with POA Divisions** – 20 Points
 - **Growing Leaders:** Clear representation of leadership and personal growth activities (7 points).
 - **Building Communities:** Demonstrates community involvement and impact (7 points).
 - **Strengthening Agriculture:** Highlights agricultural education and sustainability efforts (6 points).
- **Creativity and Originality** – 10 Points
 - Unique, innovative approach to the booth's message and presentation.
 - Effectively uses visuals and design elements to capture attention.
- **Visual Appeal and Organization** – 10 Points
 - Booth layout is neat, organized, and visually appealing.
 - Effective use of FFA Brand Guidelines for consistency in colors, fonts, and logo use.
- **Adherence to Guidelines** – 10 Points
 - Meets booth size and structure requirements.
 - Clearly displays the local chapter name and follows all guidelines, including power usage and lighting specifications.

CROP EXHIBIT GUIDELINES

SUPERINTENDENT – Kurt Murray

RULES:

- Any exhibits not displayed will be released at the completion of judging.
- Exhibitors are limited to one (1) exhibit in each class.
- Entries should be a product of that student's work. Any entry that is determined to not be the product of a student will be disqualified.
- Exhibitors are responsible for providing their own grain boxes. A recommended size is 8" x 14" with a glass cover. A blueprint for a grain box can be found on the <https://www.okffa.org/shows-fairs> website.



AGRONOMY PLANT LIFE CYCLE DISPLAY EXHIBITS

DIVISION 5401: Life Cycle of a Grain Sorghum Plant

INFORMATION

- This drawing should show all different stages of the growth of a **Grain Sorghum** plant (seed, seeding, vegetative, flowering and mature).
- Additional stages of growth may be displayed if it adds to the exhibit.
- Each stage of growth should be indicated.
- Colors should be as near as possible to natural colors.
- Special characteristics of identification should also be labeled.
- Drawings must include the title **"Life Cycle of the Grain Sorghum Plant"**.
- Use a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22" x 14"), or half sheet of white foam or mat board (finished size approx. 20" x 15") to be displayed for landscape view.
- The student's name, chapter and grade must be included on the backside of the poster.
- Only one exhibit allowed in each class per individual.

HISTORY OF AGRONOMY

DIVISION 5402: Historical Events That Shaped Crop Production

INFORMATION

- The purpose of the contest is for FFA members to research and build a display to educate the public about historical events that have affected crop production in Oklahoma and the U.S.
- The topic for 2026 is **Cyris McCormick & the McCormick Reaper.**
- FFA members are asked to write a brief description of the event and how it has changed agriculture then and now.
- The story must be in manuscript form with not more than two double-spaced typewritten pages. In addition, one, and not more than one, 4"x6" or 5"x7" color or black and white photograph accompanying the story depicting the event.
- Each page of the story and the photograph must be mounted on one full sheet (22"x28") black poster or fam/matte board (22"x30").
- Posters are to be displayed horizontally.

AGRONOMIC CROP IMPORTANCE DISPLAY

DIVISION 5403: Drones in Agronomic Crop Production

INFORMATION

- The purpose of the contest is for FFA members to research and build a display to educate the public about the importance of different agronomic crops in Oklahoma and in the U.S.
- The topic for 2026 is the use of **Drones in Agronomic Crop Production.**
- The information may be displayed creatively or in manuscript form. In addition, each classification must be identified by an actual sample, or an image/drawing attached to the display.
- Use a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22"x14") or half sheet of white foam or mat board (finished size approx. 20"x15") to be displayed for landscape view (horizontally).
- The student's name, chapter and grade must be included on the backside of the poster.
- Only one exhibitor allowed per individual.

HAY SHOW

2026 OKLAHOMA STATE FAIR - DIVISION 5404

INFORMATION

- Entries are for individual FFA members only and must be a product of their own supervised agricultural experience program (SAE).
- Classes of hay will include legume & non-legume. One bale will constitute an entry.
- All hay must have been produced in 2026 growing season.
- A sample for analysis must be submitted to local County Extension Office and **submitted with the Hay on site.**
- Sample bags, instructions for sampling and a sampling probe are available at each OSU County Extension Center. This sampling probe should be used to obtain a valid, representative sample under the direction of the County Extension director. These samples will be used for the protein analysis and must be submitted by the local OSU County Extension Center.
- Exhibitors do not have to compete in a county hay show to exhibit in this show.
- Factors considered by the judge will include maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from foreign material, color, size and shape of bales, odor, and freedom from mold.
- In lieu of entry fee, all hay becomes the property of OSF to cover the cost of the analysis.

INFORMATION

- Will be judged on freedom from disease and damage; maturity and plumpness of kernels; normal filling of tips and butts of ears; and uniformity within the entry with regard to size, shape, kernel type and color of cob.

- Will be judged on maturity and dryness; freedom from disease, damage and weather effects; uniformity within the entry of type, size, shape, and color; and care in preparation for showing.
- Entries that are wet and uncured will be disqualified.

INFORMATION

- Exhibit to be shown with petiole attached, bract leaves removed and burr side up.
- Will be judged on amount and quality of lint; freedom from disease, insect damage, and foreign material; uniformity, number of locks and length of stem; and care in preparation for showing (removal of bracts, lint condition, and suitable box or tray).

THRESHED WHEAT EXHIBIT

DIVISION 5408 – Entry Must Be 15 lbs.

INFORMATION

- All wheat exhibits must be labeled to specify the variety or name of hybrid. Small grain exhibit shall be approximately one (1) peck. Please refer to the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Fact Sheet PSS-2168 Maturity Classification of Wheat [Maturity Classification of Wheat Varieties | Oklahoma State University](#) for suggested varieties.
- Entries less than 15 pounds, and entries in different classes that are obviously divisions of an identical lot, will be disqualified.
- Entries will be judged on purity (freedom from trash, weed seeds and other grains) and grain quality (degree of plumpness, color or texture and kernel uniformity, and freedom from disease and broken kernels).
- Entries must be carefully sieved and handpicked to score high.

- Will be judged on the same basis as Division 5408, threshed grain entries less than one (1) peck, and entries by two (2) or more exhibitors in the same class that are found to be divisions of an identical lot, will be disqualified.

- Will be judged on color and brightness; and freedom from disease, damage, trash, other crops and weed seed. Entries less than one (1) peck will be disqualified.

DIVISION 5411 – One Bundle

INFORMATION

- Bundle must be not less than 3" but no more than 5" at the center band when cut near the ground.
- Should be cured (dry) before forming bundle.
- Will be judged on feeding value (green color, leafiness, fineness of stem, and best stage of maturity for each kind) and preparation of bundle, including neatness, cleanliness, uniformity and overall appearance.
- Undersized bundles, and wet or moldy bundles, will be disqualified.
- If Superintendent or judge deems that any bundle is old, from previous years, or is masked (New leaves over old) the superintendent has the right to disqualify the bundle.

- Bundle must be not less than 3" but no more than 5" at the center band when cut near the ground.

- Will be judged on feeding value (green color, leafiness, fineness of stem, and best stage of maturity for each kind) and preparation of bundle, including neatness, cleanliness, uniformity and overall appearance.
- Undersized bundles, and wet or moldy bundles, will be disqualified.
- If Superintendent or judge deems that any bundle is old, from previous years, or is masked (New leaves over old) the superintendent has the right to disqualify the bundle.

- Grasses should be headed and in the bloom stage, but not ripe enough to shatter, and shown full length (cut near the ground). Bundle should not be less than 3" or more than 5" at center band.
- Should be cured (dried) before forming bundle.
- Each bundle will be considered on basis of early stage of maturity; leafiness and green color; and on preparation and appearance of bundle.
- Undersized and oversized bundles and wet or moldy bundles will be disqualified.

PASTURE & RANGE PLANT DISPLAY

2026 OKLAHOMA STATE FAIR - DIVISION 5414

INFORMATION

- These displays consist of ten representative plants mounted on light boards 3 feet square, strong enough to stand upright.
- The plants should be shown full length, with the stems cut to prevent any part of the plant from extending beyond the edge of the board.
- Grasses and other fine-stemmed plants may be shown as bundles not to exceed one inch in diameter, and single plants that are heavy-stemmed or bushy may be used.
- Plants should be headed and in bloom or seed stage but not ripe enough to shatter.
- Label with common name (see approved lists for FFA identification contests) in letters one-half inch high. The exhibitor's name and address must be placed on the back of the board in addition to the entry tag.
- Displays will be judged on choice of species; quality of samples (green color, leafiness, dryness and stage of maturity); neatness and arrangement of samples and general appearance of display; and correctness and readability of labels.
- Entries, which are found to be identical as a result of group preparation, will be disqualified.

INFORMATION

- These exhibits must be Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) program projects of the FFA members who exhibit in this department and members must be keeping SAE records in AET.

INFORMATION

- This contest recognizes individual FFA members for their skills in creating newsworthy articles and photos that highlight the achievements of fellow FFA members and/or their local chapter. Members are encouraged to submit these stories to various forms of print and broadcast media.

SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

- **News Story:** Submit one (1) news story, written in manuscript form, not exceeding three (3) double-spaced, typewritten pages.
- **Photograph:** Include one (1) 5"x7" color or black-and-white photo related to the story.
- **Presentation:** Each page of the story and the photograph should be mounted on a large sheet of black poster or matte board, preferably with protective covering.

TOPIC:

- The story must focus on a subject related to Agricultural Education and/or FFA.

JUDGING CRITERIA:

- Entries will be evaluated on the basis of news value, readability, and organization.

NEWS REPORTING SCORING RUBRIC (35 POINTS TOTAL)

- **Readability (10 Points)**
The story is easy to read, with clear language and minimal errors in grammar, spelling, and punctuation.
- **Organization (10 Points)**
The story has a logical flow, with a strong beginning, middle, and end. Each part is cohesive and well-structured.
- **Photography (10 Points)**
The photograph is high-quality, relevant to the story, and enhances the overall presentation.
- **Presentation (5 Points)**
Pages and photograph are neatly mounted on black poster or matte board, with protective covering as needed.

SOCIAL MEDIA AG ADVOCACY CAMPAIGN

INFORMATION

- The Social Media Ag Advocacy Campaign contest provides Oklahoma FFA members with an opportunity to develop and present a digital advocacy campaign designed to inform and engage the public about agriculture or highlight the importance of agricultural education and FFA. This contest encourages skills in strategic communication and social media campaign planning.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

- Each entry must include 6 to 10 color images (screenshots) representing individual social media posts (5" x 7" each) that the member created as part of the campaign.
- Each image (screenshot) should be accompanied by a caption or message that would be used if posted on social media, emphasizing advocacy for agriculture or promoting FFA's mission. It is recommended that the pictures on the board be actual screenshots of social media posts, including graphics, photos, and text, but example posts may also be used.
- A written Social Media Plan must also be included on the poster board. This plan should be 1 to 3 typed, double-spaced pages and cover the following:
 - **Target Audience and Purpose:** Identify who the campaign is intended to reach and the main goals of the campaign.
 - **Content Strategy:** Briefly describe the theme, key messages, and intended impact of the campaign.
 - **Design and Style Details:** Outline any design choices made, such as colors, fonts, style of text, or graphic elements, and explain why these were chosen to appeal to the target audience.
- All images, captions, and the social media plan should be mounted on a 3-panel (tri-fold) display no more than 36 inches wide or 48 inches tall. The title of the social media campaign should be prominently featured on the center panel of the tri-fold for easy visibility

SOCIAL MEDIA AG ADVOCACY CAMPAIGN SCORING RUBRIC (50 POINTS TOTAL)

- **Message Impact (15 points)**
Evaluates the relevance and strength of the campaign's message, with an emphasis on agricultural advocacy or promoting Ag Education and FFA's impact.
- **Creativity and Engagement (15 points)**
Assesses originality, creativity, and visual appeal in both the posts and overall presentation.
- **Clarity and Cohesion (10 points)**
Considers the consistency and clarity of the campaign's theme across posts and alignment with the target audience and purpose.
- **Social Media Plan (10 points)**
Examines the thoroughness of the plan in defining the audience, purpose, and design details. The plan should demonstrate clear strategic thought in reaching the intended audience.
